### **EMPOWERING MALES OF COLOR THROUGH EDUCATION**

Thanks to your generosity and that of Amelia Peabody, Melvin Trust and Van Otterloos foundations, we are excited to announce the second year of Brothers for Success (BFS), a partnership with Salem State University and Salem High School. This group works with young men of color to empower them through mentoring relationships, educational opportunities, and discussions pertaining to race and culture. Brothers for Success is led by Dr. Steven Oliver, assistant professor at Salem State University's School of Education, and Dr. José Salgado, associate professor at Salem State University's School of Education and Director of the Intercultural Leadership Program. Throughout the fall, the group has been working together to develop rapport and trust through conversations, and to deepen mentoring relationships.

He participates in workshops with the Salem Theatre where he learns different ways people express their stories, whether it be through music, rap, or acting.

Elian is hoping to someday start a social enterprise in Salem.

"I don't want to just be rich," Elian explained. "I want to make money so I can help people who need it. I want to do good things for people. Your generosity helps me achieve this."



On an average day in the Teen Center, Elian helps prepare food for himself and his peers, works on his homework with our tutors, and practices his communication skills.

### O'MALEY ACADEMY - EXCITING NEW ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS FROM MUSIC TO FARMING

O'Maley Academy after school program at the O'Maley Innovation Middle School in Gloucester works with numerous local community partners to provide rich and varied curriculum for 200 students. The staff at Backyard Growers facilitate a farming/cooking class, Sound Harbor Music provides weekly guitar lessons, and Cedar Rock Organic Farm in West Gloucester hosted a group of students to teach them about organic farming techniques, help them make real-life connections, and also teach them about college and career options in agriculture and horticulture. ### **EXPANDING HORIZONS - SALEM MIDDLE SCHOOLERS GET CREATIVE**


### **HEALTHY HARBORS - MAKING AN IMPACT ON OUR OUTDOORS**

Students participating in Healthy Harbors are developing meaningful service learning activities in the Salem Woods. They have identified areas that are in need of trail maintenance and intend to assist by connecting with the Friends of Salem Woods organization to build new bridges and signs. The group, facilitated by Salem Sound Coastwatch, is also helping the community build a rain garden in Splaine Park located at the base of Salem Heights. ### **FUTURE CITY - LEAP STUDENTS CREATE AN UNDERWATER CITY**

Future City is a national competition that walks students through the entire civil engineering process as they design their own "futuristic" city. This year's theme is "green spaces". The group began by exploring various concepts in civil engineering as they designed a virtual model of their own using the software Sim City. They are currently working to complete their essay describing their city. Students will then construct a 3D model that will be brought to competition day at Northeastern University in January. We are very excited to see what the underwater city of "Grote Water Stad" (Great Water City) turns out to look like!
